THEME: The Kingdom of God! How often we hear the phrase - and usually as something absent - indeed we pray for its coming. But it is very near to us and already here when the Church is true to what she ought to be.

GLORIA: Mass of St Thomas

OPENING PRAYER: *Let us pray for forgiveness through the grace of Jesus Christ. Father, through the obedience of Jesus your servant and your Son, you raised a fallen world. Free us from sin and bring us the joy that lasts for ever.*

LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD:

1st Reading: Isaiah 66 v. 10-14. For the Jewish people Jerusalem is where God lives. At the time of Isaiah's writing, the city had not been restored in the way the people expected, yet their hope lived on. By sharing our joy in the Lord we can offer other people hope.

Rejoice, Jerusalem, be glad for her, all you who love her! Rejoice, rejoice for her, all you who mourned her! That you may be suckled, filled, from her consoling breast, that you may savour with delight her glorious breasts. For thus says the Lord: Now towards her I send flowing peace, like a river, and like a stream in spite the glory of the nations. At her breast will her nurslings be carried and fondled in her lap. Like a son comforted by his mother will I comfort you. And by Jerusalem you will be comforted. At the sight your heart will rejoice, and your bones flourish like the grass. To his servants the Lord will reveal his hand.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 65 @ Cry out with joy to God all the earth.

2nd Reading: Galatians 6 v. 14-18. St. Paul reminds us not to get hung up on mere human rules but rather boast with joy in the cross of Christ as he does. What matters is “to become an altogether new creature.”

The only thing I can boast about is the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom the world is crucified to me, and I to the world. It does not matter if a person is circumcised or not; what matters is for him to become an altogether new creature. Peace and mercy to all who follow this rule, who form the Israel of God. I want no more trouble from anybody after this; the marks on my body are those of Jesus. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit, my brothers. Amen.

Gospel Hymn: 398 v. 4 & 5.

All: Alleluia! Alleluia! I call you friends, says the Lord, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 10 v. 1-9. Jesus sends out the 72 disciples to spread his Good News ‘like lambs among wolves’ for he has no illusions of the evil in the world. Let us go out to others but let us not be put off by the evil we may encounter.

The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, in pairs, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit. He said to them, ‘The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road. Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, “Peace to this house!” And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages; do not move from house to house. Whenever you go into a town where they make you welcome, eat what is set before you. Cure those in it who are sick, and say, “The kingdom of God is very near to you.”’
