Theme: Today's readings should stop us all in our tracks! Of course we have to pay for food, energy, clothing and the essentials of life, but we often get bogged down by buying unnecessary things or generally trying to get more money. But where we are going none of these things will help us!

OPENING PRAYER: *Let us pray to the Father whose kindness never fails.* God our Father, gifts without measure flow from your goodness to bring us your peace. Our life is your gift. Guide our life's journey, for only your love makes us whole. Keep us strong in your love.

LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD:

1st Reading: Ecclesiastes 1 v 2 & 2 v 21-23. The author is quoting words of Solomon to enforce to his Jewish readers that material wealth is unsatisfying.

Vanity of vanities, the Preacher says. Vanity of vanities. All is vanity!

For so it is that a man who has laboured wisely, skilfully and successfully must leave what is his own to someone who has not toiled for it at all. This, too, is vanity and great injustice; for what does he gain for all the toil and strain that he has undergone under the sun? What of all his laborious days, his cares of office, his restless nights? This, too, is vanity.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM:

® O Lord, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.

You turn men back into dust
and say: "Go back, sons of men"

To your eyes a thousand years
are like yesterday, come and gone,
no more than a watch in the night. ®

3. Make us know the shortness of our life
that we may gain wisdom of the heart.
Lord, relent! Is your anger for ever?
Show pity on your servants. ®

2nd Reading: Colossians 3 v 1-5, 9-11. St. Paul gives some general rules for Christian behaviour. We must seek things that are above by leading a good life in this world.

Since you have been brought back to true life with Christ, you must look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. Let your thoughts be on heavenly things, not on the things that are on the earth, because you have died, and now the life you have is hidden with Christ in God. But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

That is why you must kill everything in you that belongs only to earthly life: fornication, impurity, guilty passion, evil desires and especially greed, which is the same thing as worshipping a false god; and never tell each other lies. You have stripped off your old behaviour with your old self, and you have put on a new self which will progress towards true knowledge the more it is renewed in the image of its creator; and in that image there is no room for distinction between Greek and Jew, between the circumcised or the uncircumcised, or between barbarian and Scythian, slave and free man. There is only Christ: he is everything and he is in everything.

Gospel Hymn: 60 v 4 & 5.

Acclamation: Alleluia! Alleluia! The word is truth, O Lord, consecrate us in the truth. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 12 v 13-21. Jesus tells the crowd a parable which illustrates the supreme importance of the soul and its salvation. We need to be detached from worldly goods.

A man in the crowd said to Jesus, 'Master, tell my brother to give me a share of our inheritance.' 'My friend,' he replied, 'who appointed me your judge, or the arbitrator of your claims?' Then he said to them, 'Watch, and be on your guard against avarice of any kind, for a man's life is not made secure by what he owns, even when he has more than he needs.'

Then he told them a parable: 'There was once a rich man who, having had a good harvest from his land, thought to himself, "What am I to do? I have not enough room to store my crops." Then he said, "This is what I will do: I will pull down my barns and build bigger ones, and store all my grain and my goods in them, and I will say to my soul: My soul, you have plenty of good things laid by for many years to come; take things easy, eat, drink, have a good time." But God said to him, "Fool! This very night the demand will be made for your soul; and this hoard of yours, whose will it be then?" So it is when a man stores up treasure for himself in place of making himself rich in the sight of God.'
