THEME: God does not judge by appearances, as we so often do; it is not what we seem to be that counts, but what we are. Through our celebration of Mass we pray to become more genuine and to be true worshippers of the Father.

OPENING PRAYER: Let us pray that God will increase our faith and bring to perfection the gifts he has given us. Almighty God, every good thing comes from you. Fill our hearts with love for you, increase our faith, and by your constant care protect the good you have given us.

LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD

First Reading – Deuteronomy 4 v. 1-2; 6-8. Moses urges the people of Israel to honour the commandments of the Lord. If they do, they will demonstrate to all peoples Israel’s wisdom and understanding.

Moses said to the people: ‘Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. Keep them, observe them, and they will demonstrate to the peoples your wisdom and understanding. When they come to know of all these laws they will exclaim, “No other people is as wise and prudent as this great nation.” And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God is to us whenever we call to him? And what great nation is there that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?’

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 14 © The just will live in the presence of the Lord.

Lord, who shall dwell on your holy mountain?	He who does no wrong to his brother,
He who walks without fault;	who casts no slur on his neighbour,
he who acts with justice	who holds the godless in disdain,

He who keeps his pledge, come what may; who takes no interest on a loan

Second Reading - James 1 v. 17-18; 21-22; 27. It is never a question of simply listening to the word of God. The word should be translated in lives of dedication and service. We must make acts of faith – ‘enflesh’ the word.

It is all that is good, everything that is perfect, which is given us from above; it comes down from the Father of all light; with him there is no such thing as alteration, no shadow of a change. By his own choice he made us his children by the message of the truth so that we should be a sort of first-fruits of all that he had created.

Accept and submit to the word which has been planted in you and can save your souls. But you must do what the word tells you, and not just listen to it and deceive yourselves. Pure, unspoilt religion, in the eyes of God our Father is this: coming to the help of orphans and widows when they need it, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world.

Gospel Hymn: 260 v. 4

All: Alleluia, alleluia! Your words are spirit, Lord, and they are life. You have the message of eternal life. Alleluia!

Gospel – Mark 7 v. 1-8; 14-15; 21-23. Religious officials accuse Jesus of flouting sacred traditions. Jesus denounces hypocrisy and calls his hearers to an authentic religion that emerges from the heart.

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, ‘Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?’ He answered, ‘It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture: This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.’ He called the people to him again and said, ‘Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men’s hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.’

PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

Celebrant: Jesus told us that if we love him we are to keep his commandments. We pray to the Lord for the grace we need to keep his laws.

Reader: Let us pray for the Church throughout the world; that it will always honour the word that has been planted in its heart and preach the word fearlessly.

Let us pray for our dead – that they may have entered that place where all are one in God.
