THEME: We can never stand self-satisfied before God. Our lives are a history of repentance and conversion. The first son in today's Gospel shows us that it is never too late to turn to God.

PENITENTIAL RITE (based on 2nd Reading)

Celebrant: 'There must be no competition among you, no conceit'.

Forgive us, Lord, our conceit and insincerity. Lord have Mercy.

People: LORD HAVE MERCY.

Celebrant: 'Always consider the other person to be better than yourself'.

Forgive us, Lord, our Phariseism - thinking we are superior to others.
Christ have mercy.

People: CHRIST HAVE MERCY.

Celebrant: 'No one must think of his own interests first'. Forgive us Lord for our selfishness and self seeking. Lord have mercy.

People: LORD HAVE MERCY.

Celebrant proclaims God's forgiveness.

OPENING PRAYER: Let us pray for God's forgiveness and for the happiness it brings. Father, you show your almighty power in your mercy and forgiveness. Continue to fill us with your gifts of love. Help us to hurry toward the eternal life you promise and come to share in the joys of your kingdom.

LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD

1st Reading: Ezekiel 18 v. 25-28. The contrast between the consequences of sin and of repentance is spelt out sharply by Ezekiel. 'To die' and 'to live' refer not so much to physical realities as to the quality of life that stems from the decision made.

The word of the Lord was addressed to me as follows: 'You object, "What the Lord does is unjust." Listen, you House of Israel: is what I do unjust? Is it not what you do that is unjust? When the upright man renounces his integrity to commit sin and dies because of this, he dies because of the evil that he himself has committed. When the sinner renounces sin to become law-abiding and honest, he deserves to live. He has chosen to renounce all his previous sins; he shall certainly live; he shall not die.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 24

® **Remember your mercy, Lord.**

Lord, make me know your ways, Lord, teach me your paths.

Make me walk in your truth, and teach me: for you are God my saviour. ®

Remember your mercy, Lord, and the love you have shown from of old.

Do not remember the sins of my youth. In your love remember me,

because of your goodness, O Lord. ®

The Lord is good and upright. He shows the path to those who stray,
He guides the humble in the right path; He teaches his way to the poor. ®

2nd Reading: Philippians 2 v. 1-11. St. Paul spells out what it means to follow Christ; to have his mind in us. We are to die with him so that we may rejoice with him.

If our life in Christ means anything to you, if love can persuade at all, or the Spirit that we have in common, or any tenderness and sympathy, then be united in your convictions and united in your love, with a common purpose and a common mind. That is the one thing which would make me completely happy. There must be no competition among you, no conceit; but everybody is to be self-effacing. Always consider the other person to be better than yourself, so that nobody thinks of his own interests first but everybody thinks of other people's interests instead. In your minds you must be the same as Christ Jesus.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him and we shall come to him. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 21 v. 28-32. Two clear examples of how to behave and how not to behave if we wish to enter the kingdom. The choice and the decision are ours.

Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people, 'What is your opinion? A man had two sons. He went and said to the first, 'My boy, you go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not go,' but afterwards thought better of it and went. The man then went and said the same thing to the second who answered, 'Certainly, sir,' but did not go. Which of the two did the father's will?' 'The first' they said. Jesus said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, tax collectors and prostitutes are making their way into the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you, a pattern of true righteousness, but you did not believe him, and yet the tax collectors and prostitutes did. Even after seeing that, you refused to think better of it and believe in him.'
